Program Notes

Todd Duncan was a DC-based vocalist who was the first Black vocalist to sing with a major opera company. He was also selected by George Gershwin to be the first Porgy in Porgy and Bess after the composer auditioned many singers for this role. After Porgy and Bess, Duncan continued a successful performing career that included international performances and acting in several feature films.

Duncan was also a highly successful voice teacher whose influence can still be heard in and around Washington, DC. In fact, our vocalists for this production both study with teachers who studied with Todd Duncan. Early in his career, Duncan taught voice at Howard University. He also taught privately from his home studio in Dupont Circle for decades where he trained some of the most gifted singers in the DC metropolitan area.

Todd Duncan was also a strong advocate for equal rights. At great risk to his performing career, Duncan took a stand to require that performances of Porgy and Bess in Washington, DC were integrated years before this became standard policy. Todd Duncan's legacy is one of personal courage, dedication to teaching, and consummate artistry. This program is meant to highlight his contributions and provide the catalyst for learning more about this great Washingtonian.
